Lesson Plan

- ➤ Introduction to the Romantic Age, the Romantic writers, Background reading of William Wordsworth, 'Preface to Lyrical Ballads'
- Introduction to William Blake as a Romantic poet and his style of writing (1-2 weeks)

- William Wordsworth: (i) 'Tintern Abbey' (ii) 'London' (3 weeks)
- > Samuel Taylor Coleridge: (i) 'Kubla Khan' (ii) 'Dejection: An Ode'

Unit 2

- Percy Bysshe Shelley: (i) 'Ozymandias (ii) 'Ode to the West Wind' (3 weeks)
- > John Keats: (i) 'Ode to a Nightingale' (ii) 'Ode on a Grecian Urn' (iii) 'Ode to Autumn'

Unit 3 (4 weeks)

- Mary Shelley: Frankenstein
 - Introduction to the author and the novel writing genre of science-fiction
 - Discuss the socio-cultural setting of the novel
 - Conduct small group presentations by students to encourage textual reading and critical understanding
 - Involve students in map making for a better and thorough grasp of the text
 - Discussion of probable questions

All the above shall also include written assignments, class tests, and continuous evaluation in the form of note checking and presentations.
