Α Patriarchy has used women's body to control them physically and psychologically. Physical weakness of women forms the foundation for patriarchy on which they base their argument of domesticity for women. Psychologically they are convinced that the men in the family know what is best for them. Patriarchal control over women made them physically weak and mentally meek. Even the psychological problems arising out of physical control and confinement were diagnosed as gender specific. Denial of creativity is one form of control against which women have fought even at the peril of their sanity. 'The Yellow Wallpaper' by C.P. Gilman is one story which illustrated how denial of use of one's body and creativity can drive a woman to the state of hysteria. Heterosexuality is a strong pillar of Patriarchy that establishes family as the unit in which a woman should experience bliss as a wife and mother. Katherine Mansfield in her story 'Bliss' has portrayed the disillusionment with the stereotype of mother, wife and home and also explored the idea of homosexuality. Women's chastity and dignity is another trope exploited by patriarchy to keep women under control. Rape is the ultimate tool of punishment and fear in patriarchal hands but Mahashweta Devi subverts this tool and puts patriarchal authority on the receiving end.

- A Women under patriarchy were denied a voice, as silence was imposed on them as a desired characteristic. Women poets' have expressed the pain of their existence and gender in their poetry. Plath reacts against the confinement of the self by referring to painful and violent images. The premature death of Plath's father gave her a troubled childhood that caused her to experience alienation from her surrounding and this pain is projected in her poem 'Daddy'. Emily Dickenson and Eunice de Souza portray the pain of 'otherness' and selflessness expected from women.

- Q Explain Pandita Ramabai's voyage into religion, both Hinduism and Christianity. What impact did it have on her life?
- A The pitiable position of women in Indian society was one argument given by the Britishers to prove their superiority. Western influence and orientalism initiated a movement to reform women's status in Indian society. Many measures and debates took place to educate people against child marriage and sati. Pandita Ramabai was born in this social background. Her orthodox Brahmin father decided to educate his wife and daughters. Living on the outskirts of the city Ramabai's father educated his children in Hindu scriptures. After seeing the consequence of his elder daughter's child marriage, he did not make the mistake with his younger daughter, Ramabai escaped such a fate. For a large part of her life Ramabai lived a gypsy like life wandering with her father from place to place preaching Hindu scriptures.

Ramabai could be considered privileged to have received education in an age where women were not given any education. But the kind of education she received did not equip her for to support her life. Her orthodox father did not allow his children to interact with non -Hindus, fearing such involvements would pollute their minds and customs. Her erudite status did earn her the title of Pandita but could not help her to improve her own or other women's status in life. Hindu scriptures disillusioned her because it denied women and Dalit's dignity in society. There was no forgiveness for them for their sins and doors of Heaven were open to them only if they unquestioningly surrendered themselves to the service of their husbands and master respectively.

It was in this state of disillusionment that she came under the influence of Christianity. The Christian attitude of forgiveness and support rendered even to women who had gone astray. This attracted Ramabai to Christianity. She accepted Christianity and actively engaged herself in spreading the word of Christ.

Encouraged by the missionary experience and zeal she dedicated her life to the upliftment of women by opening a sadan for the widows where they received training to live life with dignity.
