In order to ensure the effective and timely delivery of information to all the stakeholders of the institution (students, parents, teachers and management), College has steadily been making information regarding various aspects like admission, assessments and examination, timetable, study material, accounts, purchases etc, available under a single repository. The college website serves as a platform from where all relevant information, resources, documents and services can be easily accessed for quick reference, execution and decision making. MIS is being used and is useful to various stakeholders in the following way: College launched an official youtube channel <https://www.youtube.com/channel/UCVIDqAnM2AqrrpUEXnPIHrw> where video recording of conference proceedings, webinars, students cultural programs and activities are being uploaded regularly for quicker reference. This channel is being avidly watched not only by students and faculty of our institution, but also outside. To facilitate the students and faculty to get relevant information relating to admission process, academic calendar and timetable, mentoring and counselling, and regular updates about extra and cocurricular events, a dynamic website is in place. The website is a useful tool for the students to login through their unique ID and access study material, lesson plans, question bank, to upload assignments and to view daily attendance and assessment marks. A specially dedicated website is under operation for admission process which is linked to the Admission portal of University of Delhi. College provides IT facilities and support to the applicants at the time of admission. Faculty also gets the details of activities and events organised at department and college level. Institutional Email System (IES) has been created and has been further strengthened this year by bringing under its fold all functionaries of the college, principal, teachers, administrative staff and all the students. Everyone communicates through an official email IDs for better

accession of Gsuite features. Government e marketplace (GeM) portal is being used for online purchases. E tendering is done through e procurement portal and other tenders notices are archived in the college website for easy access. A Public Address System is in place in the college to make important announcements and messages address by the Principal. LEDs screens have been installed on every floor at visible locations.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our College, being affiliated to University of Delhi, follows the academic calendar and curriculum as approved and given by the University. From July 2019, College implemented the revised Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) syllabi for all Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) courses. Planning and preparation for the academic semesters begin at least one month prior to the commencement of every session. Staff Council is the statutory body where decisions are taken in a democratic manner after thorough consultative and participative process. Academic Development Committee (in consultation with the academic Department Convenors) finalises workload, assesses teachers' strength and takes other appropriate decisions. and time table for each department. subject allocations and time slots of teachers. Time table committee in collaboration with the department convenors works and frames timetable, which is uploaded for the reference of the students before the first day of the commencement of the session. Faculty members prepare a detailed Curricular planner giving outlines of lesson plan, based on pre-identified Course Outcomes (CO) and Program Outcomes (PO) with special focus on slow and advanced learners. Before the commencement of classes, orientation programs are held at the level of institution and that of academic departments. Within the structured framework, faculty is given autonomy to take decisions relating to teaching methodology, and internal assessment. Besides conventional teaching methods, various other methods like Quiz, Group Discussion, Debates, PPT Presentations, Role Play, Allied Projects, Games, Short Films, Industrial Visits, Add-on practicals, Open book MCQ tests, Assignments, videos, audio recordings, use of charts and graphs, discussion on case studies etc. make the teaching learning experience more innovative, enjoyable and effective, while enhancing rational, critical and analytical thinking among students.

Departments organise lectures, speaker sessions and workshops by renowned personalities from academics, corporate sector, policy making bodies and media were held regularly to bring the curriculum to a more application-based and career-oriented framework. For efficient implementation of all these methods and programs, the existing infrastructure of the college was further augmented.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback is regularly collected from various stakeholders: viz. students, parents, teachers and employers to ascertain the level of satisfaction about the infrastructure and learning resources available in the college. Google forms are uploaded on the college website under section Feedback and also circulated through WhatsApp for collecting regular feedback from different stakeholders. The feedback is analyzed by the college IQAC team. On the basis of feedback, continuous review of infrastructure and learning resources is carried out by respective committees and the recommendations are integrated for upgrading, maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. To take Students Feedback, there are two structured questionnaires: a) about the teaching and learning, b) about the infrastructure of the college. There are questions related to use modern teaching aids, teacher's attitude and proper guidance, conduct of regular assessments and curriculum. Hence the questionnaire is designed to elicit an actual perspective of the teaching learning experience from the student's point of view. The positive feedback points are conveyed to the respective teachers so as to motivate them to further augment their skills. At the same time, any negative feedback is shared in a right perspective and every effort is taken to overcome/improve the same. Parents Feedback: Questionnaires are shared with parents through college website and during Parent Teacher meetings. There are questions regarding parents satisfaction about the teaching learning initiatives, curriculum delivery, infrastructure availability and support facilities, student safety and grievance redressal mechanism. Parent Teacher meetings are held at the end of each semester to ensure better interaction and communication between college and parents about the student's progress and performance, to enlist parents cooperation to remediate any problems, and to refine student's individual learning plans. Employers Feedback: To ensure better placements in the future, the employer feedback form is available on the college website. Questions in this feedback include employers opinion about college infrastructure and the quality of students appearing for interviews and those getting placement. The data is analysed and used for working on those aspects which can help in enhancing the quality and employability skills of the students. Teachers

Feedback: To ensure a good working environment for the teaching faculty, regular feedback is taken through survey forms. Feedback is sought with respect to availability and functioning of teaching related infrastructure, tools and aids, Library and other reading resources, Research environment and support, ease of administrative procedures and overall recreational facilities. The data collected is assessed and a draft report is prepared. IQAC ensures that all the relevant concerns of the teachers are shared with the administration as well as the various committees that are in-charge of the matters mentioned above. Necessary steps and reforms are taken and existing procedures are either streamlined or new processes are established with the aim of providing a positive and healthy working environment for the teachers.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring is an integral part of the student's holistic development and hence college lays special emphasis on providing a well-structured and meaningful mentoring program. Mentoring is an important tool to support students to improve their learning and leadership skills, motivating them towards their future career development. With this in mind, the College has an elaborate mentorship programme wherein the faculty members mentor students with an aim to educate, stimulate and empower them so that they develop the necessary mindset, attitude and skills to make informed and meaningful choices in their life. The mentoring system is handled by a mentoring committee in coordination with the IQAC. Students are divided into groups consisting on an average about 30-40 students and each group/class is allotted a teacher as a mentor. Detailed list of the mentors (along with their contact details) and mentees is available on the college website and notice board for the students' reference. Mentors are required to keep track of their mentees with reference to academics, attendance, discipline and overall development. Mentoring sessions are held on a monthly basis which is of one-hour duration. Interactions are held in an informal manner, where students are encouraged to speak openly about any issues they face and express their views on any topic without any inhibitions. In the current session, the IQAC took an initiative named, Mentoring the Mentor Program (MMP), with a view to make the mentoring system more comprehensive, structured, focused and effective. The mentoring committee selects topics that are of relevance to students in the present day context, invites experts in the respective topics to mentor the teachers, who in turn mentor the students on these issues during the mentorship meeting. Some important topics selected for the MMP program were Health and Wellness, Relationship Management and Stress Management. During the lockdown period, mentorship meetings were held online using Google Meet. Feedback of the student is taken after every mentoring session. In addition to faculty mentors, there is also a professionally qualified Counsellor whose services are available to students. Apart from this, students are motivated to join special lectures conducted by experts to enhance their grasp on the subject and provide them wider exposure. Financially constrained students are given guidance about educational loan facilities and other financial support systems. Skill development workshops are conducted regularly for employability enhancement of students. Placement cell conducts various guest lectures and workshops for better career opportunities and organizes visits by leading corporate hubs to provide placement and internship to our students. Bisman- Centre for Human Values, and Divinity society conducts activities for nurturing ethical, and social values. Students are mentored not only as passive participant but as an active doer. With a view to ensure privacy and confidentiality, provision has been made to contact the counsellor through dedicated website. Grievance boxes are placed in the college at several convenient places so that students can inform their problems and discuss the same with their mentors.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Sri Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. The college is guided by the regulations laid down by the University regarding syllabi, academic calendar, examinations and evaluation. The University of Delhi has a system of continuous internal assessment that aims at monitoring students throughout the semesters. However, Coronavirus pandemic this year resulted in new shifts in the methods of both teaching and evaluation. As the university was shut down, and traditional in-classroom teaching was suspended, the college introduced and implemented some innovative solutions to the problem. Standard asynchronous online learning tools, such as reading/study material via Google Classroom, and college website's online portal were augmented with synchronous video and audio instruction via podcasts and video recordings on the college website. Continuous evaluation system also continued through the college online learning portal where the students were assessed and marked through various innovative projects, assignments and presentations, oral tests, mock class tests submitted on google classroom and the online portal of the college. The college also evolved a unique system facilitating students with online exams under the OBE format. New strategies were devised to handle all stages of examination, from filling-up of examination forms to the distribution of roll numbers to conducting exams through the online mode. The examination committee made special arrangements by setting up four labs which were to help physically handicapped students (especially blind) and also students who might have internet issues. So, with innovative pedagogical and evaluation process, the college continued with the internal assessment and examinations to assess the student's academic growth throughout the semester.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250

words)

Sri Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. The college strictly follows the University Academic Calendar. However, while operating within the ambit of the guidelines laid by the University, the college has a well-defined academic calendar for each department and committee.

A meeting of the Principal, Department teacher-in-charges and committee conveners is held before the commencement of the semester regarding course allocation and teaching and internal assessment and evaluation schedule as notified by the University. Since 25 marks (out of 100) are for internal assessment, the teachers engage students throughout the semester through innovative projects, assignments and presentations, oral tests, mock class tests. Although the college has to operate within the broader framework provided by the University, however, it ensures properly spaced academic and co-curricular activities. Information regarding internal assessment, and examinations is regularly displayed on the College website, notice boards. Since Teachers participate in the mandatory semester-end evaluation process of the university, they also invigilate exams in the College and help the Deputy Superintendent of examinations conduct examinations smoothly. Allocation of classrooms and computer labs is notified through the College Timetable prepared and communicated to teachers at the beginning of each semester and also notified on the college website. College has seven well equipped Computer Labs with adequate number of printers, white boards, LCD Projectors and Wifi connectivity. To facilitate teaching-learning process for visually challenged students, the college has an enabling unit which comprises of Daisy player, Braille books, special keyboards for students with low vision. Gym facilities are available for staff and students and to enable cautious use of gym equipment, an instructor has been hired to facilitate and guide all gym users. Knowledge and learning of yoga is facilitated amongst staff and students through the services of a full time yoga coach. College has consistently maintained an impressive record of achievements in the field of Sports owing to rigorous training and practice provided to our sports students through a team of highly competent coaches for different sports. College also has provision for indoor games like Carrom, Chess and Table tennis. Teacher incharge (sports) maintains a proper record of all students attending daily sports practice as well as refreshments provided to them. The college has fully operational Rain water harvesting plant, Solar power plant (1KV) and RO Water plant. With a view to curb water consumption, waterless urinals have been installed in the staff restroom(Male). Two small but aesthetically maintained lawns on both sides of the college impart a green view to the campus and are maintained by two full time Gardeners. An efficient team of Electricians, Plumber and House keeping staff assist in routine maintenance, cleaning and repair work within the campus. Through the mechanism of Staff Council, Faculty members are appointed on various committees viz. Purchase Committee, Maintenance Committee, Library Committee, Sports Committee to supervise the functionality and maintenance of college infrastructure. College provides domain based email ids to faculty as well as students to keep them informed about all important notices and information. LED Monitors have been installed on every floor to display information about upcoming events in the college. The college has a centrally air-conditioned library comprising of a computer section (to access online journals) and adequate seating arrangement for students as well as staff. Medical facilities within the campus comprise of a medical room and services of a doctor on the campus from 10AM to 2PM on all working days. A vending machine has been installed in the medical room for dispensing sanitary napkins at

nominal costs. The college campus is monitored and safeguarded through CCTVs which provide a comprehensive security cover.

It houses not only 73366 books (including rare books) but also subscribes to a good number of research journals, periodicals, magazines and daily leading newspapers as recommended by the members of academic departments from time to time. The Library has subscribed to the membership of INFLIBNET and DELNET. Each classroom is equipped with LCD projectors to facilitate usage of ICT technology in teaching. College has seven computer labs equipped with a total of 180 computers which are updated on a timely

basis. There are two smart classrooms and 4 Star Board Interactive Tablets for encouraging innovative teaching methods. For health and fitness, college Gym has been functioning with the latest equipment and facilities for recreation of the students and the staff. Elevators and ramps in the college premises enable easy mobility for the differently abled students.

Research and Development

Faculty are constantly encouraged through various platforms to conduct research involving students and publish research articles.

Examination and Evaluation

The college follows the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system in accordance with University guidelines on evaluation and assessment, which comprises of internal (25 marks) and external evaluation (75 marks). Teachers evaluate students through various mechanisms like written midterm assessments, class tests, quizzes, project reports, assignments, group discussions, response in class and attendance. For slow learners and for students engaged in sports, more opportunities like retests are provided. Students are also evaluated on the basis of the study reports submitted by them after industrial visits. During the COVID 19 lockdown, online assessments were conducted using Google forms, Google classroom, Google docs. An assessment portal was also created in the college website. The examination committee oversees the smooth implementation of the University semester exams.

Teaching and Learning

Institution motivates teachers to adopt and practice up to date modern and innovative teaching and learning methodologies. Faculty members prepare a chapter-wise, timeline based lesson plan for their respective subjects (papers), summarise course and subject outcomes, inform and discuss about pedagogical tools and methods and devise strategies for catering to the needs of student diversity in the class (like slow and fast learners, Hindi and English speaking students). Before commencing the teaching, students are briefed about the course/subject objectives, outcomes, teaching methods, lesson plan, timelines, assessment process, their roles and

responsibilities etc, and any grievances or doubts. Besides conventional teaching methods, various other methods like Quiz, Group Discussion, Debates, PPT Presentations, Role Play, Allied Projects, Games, Short Films, Industrial Visits, Add-on practicals, Open book MCQ tests, Assignments, videos, audio recordings, use of charts and graphs, discussion on case studies etc. are employed by the teachers. The college also ensured timely and efficacious completion of curriculum for students of all courses during lockdown period since March 2020. Through use of various softwares like Google classroom, Google Meet, Zoom, Skype, Whatsapp and the college website, teachers were able to deliver lectures, provide study material in the form of e resources and conduct internal assessments. The mentoring program mentioned earlier, also plays an important role in the teaching learning process.

Curriculum Development

Being a constituent college of University of Delhi, the college implements the syllabus prescribed by the same. Academic development committee holds meetings with department convenors to finalise workload, subject combinations, time table for each department. The Teacher in charge of the respective department monitors the proper implementation of teaching methods and tools, timely completion of syllabus and the internal assessments. Various methodologies are employed like incorporating theory with practical, seminars, extension lectures, workshops etc., to supplement the University's curriculum and to integrate goals and objectives of the institution. The Institution constantly encourages the faculty members to attend refresher courses and training programmes conducted for improving their skills.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice 1 Title: Mentoring the Mentor Programme(MMP) ObjectivesThe role of teachers in higher educational system has evolved and diversified in recent times. Besides, the knowledge transfer through formal curriculum delivery mechanisms, providing learners a platform for sharing and resolving their academic and other stress-related issues giving guidance, motivation, emotional support and helping them explore careers, setting goals, developing contacts, and identifying resources falls in the domain of our defined duties and responsibilities. MMP is a recent practice initiated by the IQAC of the college to firstly train the teachers to become mentors. Secondly IQAC initiated the MMP to equip the teachers with some information on the identified theme from subject experts. Thirdly it ensures uniformity of information imparted on crucial issues identified after serious deliberations. This practice serves the dual purpose of one it helps the mentors to think and disseminate information in a focused and structured manner. Two all the teachers in the institution are addressing a pre identified theme in a similar manner. In this session themes of Health and wellness and Relationship management has been successfully addressed **Context:** Mentoring is now recognized as an important part of teaching learnig process because of the various distractions and stress experienced by students. Youth now a days are extremely conscious of social relations, peer pressure, career pressure and image consciousness. All of these contribute to stress and distractions which not only hinders the teaching learning process but the student feels alienated and does not know to whom to turn to for guidbce. Faculty members rose to the occasion and recognized the responsibility of their role as mentors in the changing scenario of higher education. However, a need for a focused theme based mentoring was felt by the teachers when they experienced some difficulties, in the initial mentoring sessions, to effectively answer the questions of students spanning over varied issues and concerns. **The Practice:** Realizing the need for effective mentoring, and with a view to enhance the existing knowledge and experience and to ensure uniformity in the understanding of the subject, lectures by expert resource persons were organised. In the present academic session mentoring sessions have been

conducted on the following themes: Health and Wellness by Dr. on. 6th February 2020. Managing Relationships by Dr. Renu Kishore on 27th February 2020 Role of Teachers in Ensuring Mental Health of Students During the Lockdown by Dr. Renu Kishore on 2nd May 2020 (Webinar) During the mentoring sessions of students attendance is taken and the teacher ensures that the students fill in the feedback form. Evidence of Success: The feedback of the students on theme based mentoring is very encouraging. Theme based mentoring sessions and the themes identified was greatly appreciated and well received by the students. They have asked for more such sessions on regular basis and have asked for sessions on career guidance and stress management. Details of mentoring sessions in college and through Webinars is available on following links: Problems Encountered and Resources Required: MMP activities do take time and this disturbs the conduct of classes and teachers who are hard pressed to complete their courses complain against this loss of time. But College takes these mentoring sessions very seriously and from the next session mentoring period will be indicated in the Time Table itself to prevent loss of teaching time. Best Practice 2 Title: Collaborative Learning and Online Skill Enhancement (CLOSE) Objectives: CLOSE was conceptualized with the objective to ensure continuity of the Teaching Learning process during the Lockdown period. It was also an attempt to make good use of this time, turning adversity into an opportunity, by acquiring new skills so as to keep the faculty members abreast with the need of the time, use of technology. Context: With the sudden imposition of Lockdown due to Covid19 face to face interaction with students and colleagues was disrupted, but the teaching learning process had to continue. Along with online classes extended learning had to continue. Now that the constraint of time was not a restrain the challenge was to acquire resources for enhancement of knowledge. Reaching out to colleagues far and near lead to collaborating effort and resources. Internet had become everyone's lifeline, and the possibility of exploring resources online gave rise to the idea of Webinars. The Practice: The commonality of need and purpose brought together three institutes, Anand School of Social Work, Bhopal School of Social Sciences and Sri Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College to sign a MOU to collaborate in Research activities, student exchange programmes, skill development programmes and placement activities. CLOSE is one activity undertaken to collaboratively organize webinars for the benefit of students and faculty. Few broad areas for focus such as Gender, mentoring, Quality Assurance, IQAC functioning and use of ICT tools, were identified. The list reveals that care was taken to ensure that needs of all stakeholders were catered to and they felt connected and involved. Each institute benefitted from the collaborative nature of the webinars. It facilitated resource identification, division of labour and most importantly interdisciplinary approach to topic identification and content of webinars and the discussions that followed. E-FDP on Blended Learning was organized to upgrade faculty skills in ICT. This was an indept guidance on how to conduct online classes and keep the students engaged and access this understanding. Information was also provided on what platforms can classes be conducted and what softwares can be used for various teaching needs. CLOSE has also contributed to resource generation, though in an indirect manner, as most of the Resources Persons in the webinars were persuaded to render the service pro bono. The audience reach out was larger and cost to the institutions negligible. Evidence of Success: Is in the number of Webinars organized, in the number of participants attending the webinars and in the press coverage it received. ? The webinar was organized on the "Benefits of Digital Administration in Lockdown", on 1st May 2020, in association with the IQAC of Ramlal Anand College, University of Delhi. Around 150 participants attended the webinar across the country. ? The webinar on the topic "Role of Teachers in Ensuring Mental Health of Students during the Lockdown" on 2nd May, 2020. The focus was on the unprecedented scenario of lockdown, with complete disruption of routines which led to psycho-social upheavals, stress, frustration and mental health concerns. ? On 3rd May, 2020,

the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) organised a webinar on the topic "NAAC RAF CRITERION-III Research, Innovations And Extension" ? Webinar on the topic "Lockdown aur Covid-19 ke Paripeksh mein Yog ka Mehetva" on 5th May 2020 was organised. The speaker was Dr. Vijay Kumar Karn, Associate Professor at Vidyant Hindu PG College, University of Lucknow. He introduced the benefits of Yoga, especially in the context of the pandemic of COVID 19. ? The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of Sri Guru Nanak Dev Khalsa College in the third lecture in the joint series jointly organised a webinar on the topic "Intellectual Property Rights" ? A webinar was on the topic "CSR- A Quality Approach to Post Emergency Development" on 12th May 2020 ? The webinar was organised for the students as well as teachers on the topic "Now Men Need to Challenge Patriarchy" on 13th May 2020 under the aegis of Internal Quality Assurance Cell(IQAC). ? A weeklong Online Faculty Development Programme (FDP) on Blended Learning from 18th to 23rd May 2020. This national level collaboration has attracted more than 150 participants from across various states of the country, which includes senior professors from both government and private educational institutions. Quest Alliance, an agency which has immense experience in online learning, is the knowledge partner for the programme. The objective of the FDP is to build capacities of the faculty, which in turn will help students develop better skills. ? Organizing donation Drives for the underprivileged. 5. Organising Literacy drives in the underprivileged colonies. 6. Participate in managing traffic during events organized by the Govt. and DGMC 7. Organize talks and awareness campaigns on social issues such as gender. 8. Awareness drives are multi-pronged, academic in organizing essay writing and quizzes, community oriented in organizing rallies and Nukkar Nataks along with signature drives. 9. Reiterating one's commitment to social causes by undertaking oath taking ceremonies. 10. Students actively engaged in e - campaigns in the fight against Covid 19. The learning derived out of these social engagements is tremendously beneficial for the participants: 1. It hones their personality and makes them sensitive human beings. 2. It makes them grateful for the privileges enjoyed by them. 3. They acquire skills of communication, both of interaction and content writing. 4. It encourages them to think about social issues and engage with them positively. 5. They learn how to organize a campaign and all that is required to make it a success. 6. They learn from peers. 7. Involvement in NSS activities at times help them to shed their own inhibitions and achieve clarity of thought. 8. On one hand they learn leadership qualities and on the other submit to discipline. 9. Learn to appreciate different perspectives and opinions. 10. Most importantly success lies in team effort and not in the individual.

8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

Covid 19 pandemic has caused a churning in individuals and institutions. It has convinced one and all of the necessity to use technology to survive, become self sufficient and reach out to the community because one cannot survive alone. It has also emphasised the need to relook into our personal and professional roles and goals. There is definitely a need to realign our actions and thoughts with the professed objectives and outcomes, that of inculcating social responsibility and imparting training to students to help them achieve their professional goals and responsive and sensitive citizens of the country. With this in mind following activities have been identified for the next academic session: 1. Two online courses will be designed and initiated keeping in mind the change ushered in by Covid 19 in the professional sphere and social relations. 2. Delegation and accountability of work to be further streamlined. Need for this is felt on two accounts, one it will enhance belongingness of staff members towards the institution and two it will increase transparency in the functioning of the college. 3. In consultation with the immediate neighbourhood at least two activities will be undertaken. NSS initiatives in this session has paved the path for increased interaction with the community around the college in activities mutually beneficial to all. 4. Processes will be put in place to facilitate administrative and academic interface. This is intended to deliver work in a timely manner without encroaching and interfering with each other's work and time. 5. Workshop for students to hone their organizing skills. College takes pride in providing opportunities to students to organize societies and events and it is felt that they should be trained and exposed to techniques of time management, resource management, team building and keeping focus on the goal and objective of the event. 6. Organize field trips to familiarise students with real life formalities and processes and survival skills. It is important to expose students to real life scenarios and procedures so as to equip them for the real life challenges. 7. Start a garden society to create awareness, give gardening tips and create a vertical garden with the objective of creating environment awareness and more importantly introducing to students the therapeutic advantage

of gardening. 8. Bring together a group of students who will take the responsibility of identifying a difficulty in or around college and present a proposal for solving the problem. 9. Train students for MCQs and Open Book Exams. The final Semester students due to Covid 19 crisis were suddenly faced with the challenge of open book exams 10. Encourage and train teachers in the use of online teaching learning tools. Recent experience during the Lockdown has motivated teachers to develop content for online delivery but has also brought forward the challenges and lack of tools and techniques to effectively engage in online teaching.
