THE DANCE OF LAVA SEEN AT LA PALMA: A VOLCANIC ERUPTION




La Palma, you might be hearing this name for the first time, isn't it? La Palma is one of the Canary islands located near Spain, it has been facing continuous volcanic eruptions, causing threats to the citizens, tourists, economy, and most importantly, the environment, the eruption occurs and flows patiently and reaches the river bed which can be more deadly causing massive explosions triggering the toxics gas, this massive eruption caused thousands of native members to evacuate and eventually the visitors to La Palma, wasn't able to make it to the Airport as the authorities had shut down the Airstrip. Statistics prove the flow of lava is not under control, covering a vast area of lands (farmlands) around 637 acres, destroying nearly 500 buildings and 21 km of roadway. The volcanic eruption has cost the natives humorously, destroying their farmlands, buildings, and roadways and crashing the economy of a small island. World's whitest paint that eliminates the need for air conditioning



Want to save big on your air conditioning bills? Wait a few years to coat your home with the world's whitest paint, which may dramatically reduce or even eliminate the need for air conditioning. In the 2022 edition of Guinness World Records, the Guinness World Records title has been earned by the paint developed at Purdue University which is now available for purchase.

Interestingly, the goal of the researchers was not to break a record for the whitest paint but to curb global warming. "When we started this project about seven years ago, we had saving energy and fighting climate change in mind," said Xiulin Ruan, a professor of mechanical engineering at Purdue.

With the idea of creating a paint that would reflect sunlight away from a building, Ruan started researching with his graduate students at Purdue. The formulation of paint that Ruan's lab has created reflects 98.1% of solar radiation and at the same time emits infrared heat. The surface coated with this paint is cooled below the surrounding temperature without consuming power because the paint absorbs less heat from the sun than it emits. Using this new paint formulation to cover a roof area of about 1,000 square feet could result in a cooling power of 10 kilowatts, Purdue researchers showed in a published paper. "That's more powerful than the air conditioners used by most houses," said Ruan.

272 g of e-waste per transaction on an average: Study highlights Bitcoin's growing e-waste problem



The sustainability of Bitcoin, a digital currency is being called into question due to its increasing energy consumption. However, so far most studies have ignored that Bitcoin miners cycle through a growing amount of short-lived hardware that could exacerbate the growth in global electronic waste. E-waste represents a growing threat to our environment, from heavy metals and toxic chemicals leaching into soils, to water and air pollution caused by improper recycling, the situation is worsening each day. Economists from the Dutch central bank and MIT in the journal Resources, Conservation and Recycling, in a new study, highlight that a single Bitcoin transaction generates 272 grams of e-waste. They further added that "The lifespan of Bitcoin mining devices remains limited to just 1.29 years," the authors said. "The soaring demand for mining hardware may disrupt global semiconductor supply chains." According to Statista.com, Bitcoin's total e-waste production is still only 0.11% of the global estimate. However, the fact that platforms like Ethereum and Cardano have been cutting energy consumption by as much as 99% could make statistics like this troublesome for the world's most valuable cryptocurrency.

Climate-friendly cooling chips- are they the future of refrigeration



Chemicals used in air conditioning, freezers and refrigeration have long hurt the environment by destroying the ozone layer and polluting water sources, but technology is starting to change the way we keep cool. While the global warming impact has been reduced in recent years, refrigerants still have issues with toxicity and flammability. Phononic, a startup based in Durham North Carolina, is using a material called bismuth telluride to make so-called cooling chips.

Tony Atti, Phononic co-founder and CEO explained that "When electricity runs through the chip the current takes heat with it leaving one side of the chip to cool and the other to heat up." Depending on how many coolants are needed, the chips can be as small as a fraction of a fingernail or as big as a fist. So far they have been used to create compact freezers for vaccine transportation and for ice creams at convenience stores. It's about "cooling and heating our modern world responsibly, without toxic refrigerants," states the company.
